Those of you who are familiar with A.A. Milne may recall a story about a 'Blustery Day'? Well, such a day (hurricane Francis I think?!) it was when finally our Deputy Intendant General, Ill.Kt. Nicholas White, was able to meet with Kevin Downing from Kernow Young Carers and make the photographed presentation of a cheque on behalf of the Grand Sovereign's Care for Children Fund and our Intendant General R.Ill.Kt. Richard Lucas and the Division of Devon and Cornwall. So, on a damp, blustery and sometime sunny day at a lakeside location in Helston we carried out that activity.

Kevin was able to outline some of the work that our donation to Kernow Young Carers, made in March this year, does with young carers in the County and the activities that were being provided before and throughout the Covid lockdown as well developing activities for small groups who could meet as things ease. These are young people who have found that they have taken on caring roles for parents and family members who have been affected by illness or disabilities. From first-hand experience Ill. Kt Nic was able to tell Kevin of the immense and invaluable support that had been given to a young person of his family living in Cornwall and of the benefit that this person and parents derived from the support, physically, practically and emotionally. Kevin thanked the Red Cross of Constantine and the Division for the generous donation and offered to provide an update on activities for which the funds have been used with many young carers.

They are also providing emergency and end-of-life to families going through the most difficult times imaginable, helping them make precious memories in the time they have together.


As they say, they wouldn't be able to do any of this without the generosity, kindness and community spirit of people like us.





Staying with the Red Cross of Constantine

The Division of South Wales and Monmouthshire prepare to say good by to their Intendant-General



The Intendant-General for the Red Cross of Constantine Division of South Wales and Monmouthshire, R.II.Kt. Graham Spencer Gubb, K.C.C., has announced that he will retire from Office on 21st September 2020, following the completion of ten years' service.

Invested on 15th September 2010, he succeeded R.III.Kt. Roy Saunders, but Graham was not the first choice as Roy's replacement, because III.Kt. Rev. D. Brian Thomas had originally been selected to step up from the position of Deputy Intendant-General. Unfortunately, Rev. Thomas had to withdraw at extremely short notice due to personal reasons and so with only 14 days before the appointed date for the Investiture of the new Intendant-General, Graham was catapulted into that position. All the usual arrangements associated with the Investiture had already been put in place, so all that was really needed was a speedy reprint of the Summons and production of a new Patent of Appointment. It sounds quite straightforward, until you realise that Rev. Thomas decided to announce his withdrawal on the Saturday morning of the August Bank Holiday, which put a little more pressure on the then Grand Recorder R.III.Kt. John Brackley and Divisional Recorder III.Kt. Alan Thomas, both of whom coped with supreme serenity. Most Illustrious Knight Richard V. Wallis, G.C.C., Grand Sovereign - and his team - performed the Investiture, which took place at Bridgend

Masonic Hall supported by a considerable gathering of Knights from within the Division and Visiting Dignitaries.

Graham has been a member of the Red Cross of Constantine since 1983 and has served as Sovereign of 5 Conclaves, including the Divisional Recorders Conclave based in the West Midlands. He has at various times and in succession, held the Divisional Offices of Assistant Recorder, Recorder, Marshal and Deputy Intendant-General, serving under no less than four Intendants-General: in addition he has also been Provincial Prior for the Order of the Temple in the Province of Monmouthshire and South Wales and Deputy Grand Master Mason in the Worshipful Society of Operative Masons for the Region of Western Counties and South Wales. He has been a member of The Grand Sovereign's Council and was awarded the honour of a Knight Commander of Constantine in 2020.

During his tenure as Intendant-General, R.III.Kt. Graham has been active throughout the Division and has maintained links with all neighbouring Divisions and some further afield. His easily approachable demeanour and wry humour have managed to cement the camaraderie of the Knights in the Division which, of course, covers the three Craft Masonic Provinces of Monmouthshire, South Wales and West Wales, with 12 Conclaves in total stretching from Pontypool in the East to Cardigan in the West.

The Worthy Knights of his Division wish him a long and restful retirement.

Continuing our look at some of the portraiture at Mark Masons' Hall and the personalities behind the pictures.



Meetings in the Brazil Room at Mark Masons' Hall are held under the watchful gaze of three personalities in portrait. The 3rd and 4th Earls of Stradbroke, who we featured a few weeks ago, hang full length and almost life size, either side of the Junior Warden's Chair in the South. But a much less imposing figure looks down from above the Worshipful Master's Chair in the East, that of Giovanni Battista Cipriani, aka Jean Baptisite Cipriani, aka Giuseppe Cipriani.

Having been born in Florence in 1727 he moved to England in 1755 after a brief spell in Rome, honing his skills as an artist and engraver. Here his reputation grew, earning him many high-profile

commissions including work in Buckingham House (the central building of today's Buckingham Palace), Somerset House, and a frontispiece for the 1784 Constitutions of the Craft (pictured below) as well as becoming a founder of the Royal Academy of Arts.

But what has he to do with Freemasonry and MMH? In 1777, a previous building occupying our site at 86 St James's Street was called the Thatched House Tavern. And here met Lodge of the Nine Muses No. 235 (then No. 502). An account of the early workings of the Lodge records that Cipriani was raised to the third degree in January of that year.

The Lodge seems to have derived its name from the several artists, sculptors, writes and musicians who belonged to it and it boasts a fine collection of antique belongings dating right back to these early days of its history.

It's incredible to think that 243 years and two buildings later, this ancient Lodge is still holding meetings on the very same site. The story of the Lodge in itself is an interesting one and they have a very good website Here⁷ with further papers on their origin.


We are especially grateful to them for allowing this (copy of an original) self-portrait of Cipriani, presented to the Lodge in 1878, to hang in the Brazil Temple, and for permitting their fabulous candlesticks to accompany the pedestals in the East, West and South.



We look forward to receiving your entries. Below are some pictures which may provide inspiration.


