When the end is only the beginning?

In May 2022 Mike Ross, supported by Paul Stevenson, decide that they needed to do something to support the people of Ukraine who had suffered so terrible over many months.

They decided that the best way forward was to purchase and deliver an ambulance to Ukraine to assist the already depleted health service there.

The fund raising started and as soon as Gary Horstman heard that Mark Masons were involved, he approaches the Mark Benevolent Fund to ask if there was any way that they could support to idea.

To our great surprise they immediately donated £10,000.00 which covered to cost of the ambulance, this meant that all other monies raised by Mike Ross and Paul could be used to purchase medical supplies which were in very short supply in the Ukraine.

Once the ambulance was purchased, they then set about organising the route into Ukraine together with all the necessary paperwork and permissions.

In May, Mike and Paul set off on their journey travelling across France into Germany and Poland and then into Ukraine where they dropped of the medical supplies and the ambulance.

However, Mike surprised us all by telling us that not only had he managed to get the medical supplies, but he had also filled any spare space with TLC bears and food for a local orphanage who his contact in Ukraine had told him about, so, "on the way" he dropped into the orphanage and delighted the children with the gifts of bears, food and sweets.

Mike and Paul then returned back to Poland to fly home.

This should have been the end of story, but not with Mike Ross & Paul Stevenson, immediately on their return they started to think about those poor people in the orphanage, which consisted of not only orphans but mothers & children who through no fault of their own have been forced to flee their homes with little more than the cloths on their backs to the relative safety of the orphanage.

While at the orphanage he was told they had no form of transport and that they had rely on local volunteers for their transport needs this was at best hit & miss and posed great difficulties when arranging hospital appointments.

So, Mike and Paul decided they would change this and buy them a vehicle, they started to raise money and once again told Gary Horstman what they were doing.

When the Mark Benevolent Fund team found out what was happening, they immediately supported us by donating another £10,000.00.

Mike and Paul were then able to move forward and buy a 16-seater minibus, they also arranged for a transit van to be purchased by Eddy Sharp to help the orphanage move goods as well as children.

Not happy to stop at this Mike then called round local Charities and friends and was able to fill both vans with must needed medical supplies together with food and beds for the orphanage, a total of £30.000,00 in goods plus the two vehicles were then taken over the continent to Ukraine.

This time Gary Horstman Joined Mike and Paul on the trip and they were further supported by Eddy Sharp and Kelly Derkatsch who drove the transit van.

Having left England, the route this time took us through Holland into Germany, Poland and into Ukraine, on arriving at our hotel in Krakow we spoke to a couple of people in reception, only to find that they were Masons from Las Vegas, she was a lady mason, and he was a member of several Lodges in the USA, what a small world.

Having entered Ukraine we headed for our 1st drop which was in Lviv to deliver the medical supplies.

The following day we left Lviv and headed for Orphanage in Chernivtsi, were we delivered the minibus, transit van and all the aid, on arrival we were greeted by the volunteers, mothers and children, the children were delighted when they received the letters from the children in the UK and reciprocated by giving us letters to take back.

The orphanage they arranged to transport 4 of us to the Romanian border and to transport Kelly Derkatsch to the train station as she was returning to Lviv to volunteer as a first responder medic.

There was one problem with this trip, having left both vehicles at the orphanage we had no way to get 5 people out of Ukraine, however as we know, masonry is universal, so after some phone calls from Gary via Mark Grand Lodge we were put in touch with the Provincial Grand Secretary of Romania, who in true masonic fashion organised for Mark Men to collect us from the Romanian side of the Ukraine border.

A member of staff at the orphanage then offered to drive us all to the border, where we crossed on foot taking only one hour instead of the three hours it took for us to get into Ukraine.

After crossing on foot, we were meet by Sabin Murariu, Alex Anti and wife Catalina, who had travelled 100 kilometres to help us, not only had they booked us into a hotel, but they stayed with us a paid for our evening meal, drinks, and our hotel rooms, what a generous gesture.

However, our trip was not yet at an end, we then had to travel by train to the airport, after a delay of an hour and a half we finally arrived back in the UK six days after leaving the UK.

We met so many fantastic people on the way and made so many friends as well, but more importantly we made a small difference to the lives of those in Ukraine who were in need.

My thanks go to all those who helped us on the way and to the members of the Mark who by their support of the Mark Benevolent Fund made it all possible, the Magic of The Mark is alive and well in every Mark Masons heart.

The Provincial Prior warmly welcomed the many distinguished guests from other Provinces, together with representatives of many of the other Masonic Orders in Surrey. He personally thanked R.E.Kt. Trevor Gulliver, K.C.T. for kindly playing the organ at our Provincial Meeting.



The Roll of Officers of Provincial Priory was called by the Provincial Registrar. The Provincial Vice-Chancellor presented the Minutes of last year's annual meeting and his report of the Province during the preceding year. Both were accepted and approved and E.Kt. Miguel was thanked for all his efforts during the year. The accounts for the year to 31st August 2021 were presented and approved.

The Provincial Prior- proposed donations to charity including £1,000 to the St John Eye Hospital; £500 to the Prostate Cancer Project; £500 to Smile; £500 to Shannon Court; and £500 to Switches.



K.Kt. Steve Jones, Provincial Warden of Regalia, was conducted to the Provincial Prior and presented him with a cheque for £1,242 from sales of regalia. In recognition for all Steve's fund raising over several years the Provincial Prior made a field appointment of E.Kt. Steve Jones to Past Provincial Registrar.

The Provincial Prior announced that he was pleased to re-appoint E.Kt. Peter Brown as the Provincial Sub Prior. He was then proclaimed by the Provincial 2nd Herald, E.Kt. Robin Tomson and saluted by the Knights of Surrey.

The Provincial Vice-Chancellor then called out the names of those Knights who the Provincial Prior had appointed to hold Provincial Office in the coming year. Each Knight was conducted to the Provincial Prior who invested him with the authority of that Office.

Four new Members for the Castell Nedd Preceptory No. 577



Saturday, 2 July was a special day for R.III.Comp. Steve Bradford as he became the District Grand Master of the North Midlands in the Order of Royal and Select Masters. However, towards the end of the meeting, the Grand Master, Most Illustrious Companion Kessick John Jones, called upon his D.C. to escort III.Comp. Ernest William Tryner to him. Ernest was somewhat taken aback and, when

he realised what was going on, uttered the words 'I shouldn't be here.' He was then addressed by the Grand Master who promoted Ernest to Past Grand Lecturer, making him Very Illustrious Companion, and the whole assembly applauded the occasion. Ernest had been a member of the Derbyshire Council No. 111, meeting at Littleover, since June 1992. He had become its T.I.M. in October 2002 (at the age of 77 – just when many Masons are thinking of reducing their Masonic commitments!) and had received his first Grand Rank in the Order in 2008. He was promoted to Past Grand Conductor of the Council in 2016.

V.III. Comp. Ernest was a WWII veteran, joining the army a few days before D Day. One story that he related some years ago was that, when he had gone to Freemasons Hall at Great Queen Street, the entourage in procession swept past him and his colleagues who were waiting to receive their Grand Chapter appointments, and Ernest turned to his neighbour and said 'that's the second time that fellow's walked past without acknowledging me'. His colleague then asked him when the first time had occurred. Ernest said, 'Nijmegen Bridge 1945'. The man in question was Colonel Sir Alan Adair.

Ernest has been a regular contributor to ceremonies in the Order of Royal and Se lect Masters and indeed had explained the signs and secrets in the Most Excellent Master degree in late June this year, a few days before the North Midlands meeting. The delivery was performed in a remarkable way for a man of 96!

Ernest expressed his thanks for the promotion, commenting that he didn't deserve it – but the Grand Master said, 'Yes you do!'

The charity Kent Association for the Blind received £2,000 as part of the Match Funding Project. The Funds were presented by R.Wy.Bro. Kevin Johnson, Provincial Grand Supreme Ruler for Kent.

The charity has recently launched its new mobile site vehicle that travels to three sight centres in Maidstone, Canterbury and Bromley supporting almost 13,000 blind or visually impaired residents. The funds paid for a demonstration model of new smart glasses by Oxsight and are designed specifically for central vision loss and are proven to help with macular conditions.


Smart glasses can enhance the remaining sight for individuals with peripheral vision loss. They are fitted with a camera streaming a live feed into two HD video displays, projecting high-contrast and defined images to your usable area of vision. This can potentially increase your field of view to 68 degrees horizontally.







A personal reflection upon the first two weeks as Provincial Grand Supreme Ruler for Cheshire & North Wales



Having spent two years as Provincial Grand Visitor, two years as Provincial Grand Guide, followed by one year as Provincial Grand Counsellor then five years as Deputy Provincial Grand Supreme Ruler, I didn't expect much to change, but I was wrong!

When I was appointed Deputy, one of my new colleagues said to me that it was the best job in Freemasonry; the Deputy got all of the fun whilst the Provincial Grand Supreme Ruler had all of the pressure.

I approached my new position with apprehension.

The members of the Province that I spoke to all said they would support me, but I was taking over a Province not really in the best of health. We were just coming out of the worst two years we had all ever faced, and whilst the pandemic hadn't affected the membership as much as we had originally feared, the consequences were now starting to bite, with losses, both permanent and medical, plus an underlying fear for some members with a reluctance to return.

At my Investiture, I announced that my immediate target was to consolidate what we had, to make sure that our fourteen Conclaves built on what remained and grew in strength in the coming months.

My focus was happy gatherings, based on the concept that if we enjoyed our meetings, that enjoyment would spread into our other Masonic activities, up to a point where our Masonic colleagues would begin to question the source of our developing enjoyment in Freemasonry, eventually leading to increased membership.

And so it began.

Day one, the day following my Investiture, was a morning meeting of Carregyr Wyddfa Conclave No 633 in Bangor. Just the third meeting of the Conclave in the far western boundary of the Province. My lift, from a Right Worthy Brother, collected me at 8:30 in his electric vehicle, having calculated that it would cost less than £2 to take us there and back. We arrived in plenty of time to hear the first challenge of the day, the Supreme Ruler had been struck down with a bad chest infection, which prevented attendance.



My new Deputy, in his first appearance, volunteered to take the Chair, and delivered a wonderful Induction ceremony. Of course, unable to sit quiet on the side-lines, I explained the Weapons of the Order to our newest member, and presented him with a tie of the Order. The absolute delight was our newest member was born in 1997, making him just under 25, and undoubtedly lowering the average age of the Province quite significantly.

I was delighted to be accompanied by 17 other members of the Province who were not hung-over after our meeting 24 hours previous. Our newest Conclave continues to grow local strength, thereby assuring its future.

Day two, Conclave two, another trip to Wales to visit Maen Achwyfan Conclave No 514, our secondnewest Conclave, to welcome the Grand Visitor.



Another Induction, and one this time I wasn't involved in. However, delighted that the Grand Visitor offered to deliver the Address to the Candidate, in an excellent manner.

Another well-attended meeting with 18 other members.

This job is starting to grow on me. I'm having fun.

Next comes a weekend off. Chance to catch up on some correspondence and reflect on the last 3 days.

Monday brings a diversion. A Provincial Team Visit in the Scarlet Cord to Mercia Consistory No 72 in Macclesfield. I am the Provincial Director of Ceremonies, and also acted as the Consistory Director of Ceremonies for one First Grade and four Second Grades. Another highly enjoyable evening, and with it being a team visit, lots of members of my Province present as well.

Tuesday, is it only day three? Back to work properly this time as it's my mother Conclave, Norton Priory Conclave No 226 meeting in Runcorn, where I am Secretary.

We were scheduled to have two candidates for Induction, but one tested positive for COVID on Sunday, so just the one.

Another excellent ceremony; another visitor from outside of the Province and a prospective joiner, another well-attended meeting with 18 members from across the Province.

The best part of the evening was when, as Secretary, I reported on various communication, and expressed concern about how difficult it was to perform as Secretary and Prov.G.S.R., and received a volunteer to take on the role of Secretary from the Installation.

I'm really having fun now!

Five days break. No Masonic meetings, just time to catch up on correspondence and work, and reflect on the journey to date. One week in the job. Three Conclave meetings. Three new members. Perhaps it is working.

The following Monday brings another morning trip to Wales, this time to visit Dewi Sant Conclave No 457 for an Installation.

I had delegated the Commission to my Deputy, and I was only really going to support him and because it was another Conclave I wanted to visit in my new capacity. Plus, our new Hall Manager at Runcorn wanted to travel to other Masonic Halls to see how they operate. This represented an ideal opportunity to visit Elwy Hall, as Dewi Sant were inviting Ladies to Lunch.



My now Provincial Chauffeur collected me 9:00 and we had a good journey into Wales, leaving in the rain and arriving in the sun.

I had been in contact with the Secretary the previous evening, who was decrying the absence of the Director of Ceremonies due to COVID. I offered, as I wouldn't have him or the Conclave struggle on such an important occasion. He apologised the following day, as he'd felt guilty allowing me to do it, but I'm all for getting stuck in and enjoying myself.

An excellent and well-attended ceremony, witnessed by 19 members of the Province, with many being involved in the ceremony. The Festive Board luncheon was boosted by 14 ladies and three future candidates, and a highly delightful 8 course menu was enjoyed by all, especially the liquid courses! Having left home at 9:00 am, I felt that returning home just before 7:00 pm, a ten-hour meeting represented a rather long though enjoyable day. I'm just glad I wasn't driving.



Meeting five, a trip to the Provincial 'home' at Chester, for a meeting of Christleton Conclave No 504.

This would be a difficult one. At their previous meeting they had put forward a notice of Motion to suspend their warrant due to falling membership and attendance. I had been at that meeting and expressed a desire that between us we could address the situation. My predecessor had closed his reign by the consecration of a new Conclave, and I didn't want to start mine by closing one. I had worked with them to try to address the situation, but the item still needed to appear on the summons.

The meeting started well, with the Supreme Ruler and Counsellor stuck in a traffic jam on the M56 car park, resulting from a three-car pileup. Fortunately, a 'willing' volunteer in the shape of our Provincial Grand Recorder stepped forward and offered to take the Chair in what he thought would be the interim. As it turns out, it was for the entirety of the Princes Ceremony, and what an excellent job he did.

The Conclave had offered to host two Princes ceremonies on behalf of Carreg yr Wydd fa Conclave, and between the officers of the two Conclaves and visitors a wonderful ceremony was performed, a fact endorsed by the candidates standing during the greetings to thank everyone who partook, stating how much they had enjoyed the ceremony.

The Supreme Ruler arrived just before the end of the ceremony, and was invited to take his seat once it was concluded.

He was then able to conduct the business, including dealing with the agenda motion, which was withdrawn due to applications received from five joining members and two candidates. An absolutely wonderful result. Enthusiasm for the Conclave's future was clearly demonstrated by the attendance of 27 Brethren from across the Province.

So, two weeks in. Five Conclaves attended, each with a well-above average attendance. Now sitting on the 'side-lines', delivered the Weapons three times and the Lecture once. Three new members. One new Supreme Ruler, with a further three new members to bring in. One saved Conclave, enhanced by five joining members and two new members for their next meeting.

It all seems to be going rather well!

The Order of the Secret Monitor is a wonderful Order, and the members of the Province of Cheshire and North Wales are gathering around to ensure that each meeting is a happy and joyous occasion.

We seem to be achieving my early target, and I am riding on a wave of euphoria.

Sadly, we now have a domestic break until September, when I look forward to it all starting over again. I will, of course, be visiting other Provinces in the interim.

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At the meeting of Mark Grand Lodge at Freemasons' Hall on Tuesday, the Pro Grand Master, M.W.Bro. Raymond John Smith, announced that the Mark Benevolent Fund would be donating £25,000 to the Mark Inspectorate of Romania who have been working proactively in many ways to provide support and relief to their neighbours in Ukraine.

This tremendous endeavour has touched Freemasons across the Constitution and many of our Brethren are keen to add their own support by making a donation.

We have set up a Relief Chest with the M.C.F. under the name of the **Mark Emergency Relief Fund** and you can now make donations in a variety of ways.

We know that there is enormous support for this already. To make the administration of donations as smooth as possible, enabling funds to be transferred efficiently to where they are needed most, we ask that you note the following advice regarding donations:

For individual donations of less than £100 - please make arrangements with your Mark Lodge for these to be collected centrally and then for the Lodge to make one consolidated donation into the Fund. These consolidated donations will count toward the Lodge's M.B.F. honorifics, rather than each individuals.

Donations of £100 or more may be made by individuals directly into the fund and will count towards the Brother's M.B.F. Honorifics

V.W.Bro. Cristian Mihutoiu, Grand Inspector for Romania has sent us details of the humanitarian activities he and his Brethren are developing for the Ukrainian refugees.

1) ACCOMMODATION

For both refugees coming from the North by car and on foot, and those coming from the South by ferry, there are requirements for short term accommodation places for at least 3-4 days, after which some of them are travelling to other European countries while others are being hosted by Romanian families. For this purpose we are cooperating with the Government to supply the following facilities:

- special tents for more than 20 people

- electrical heating devices
- beds and blankets
- personal hygiene products

On the other hand, there are many small hotel owners which offer their facilities for the refugees asking in return for the payment for the utilities (gas, water, electricity).

2) MEDICAL SUPPLIES

- emergency kits
- small surgery kits
- antibiotics and other different medicines
- disinfecting solvents
- cleaning sets
- medical face masks

3) FOOD AND WATER SUPPLIES

- sandwiches
- warm food freshly prepared
- still water
- disposable plates and cups

4) TRANSPORTATION FROM THE BORDER TO DIFFERENT CITIES AND AIRPORT

Many Ukrainian refugees are leaving Romania after 3-4 days spent at the border, through the major airports, especially Bucharest. So they need free transportation.

5) SPECIAL PSYCHOLOGICAL CARE FOR CHILDREN AND MOTHERS

Small children and mothers are very shocked and need specialised psychological assistance to recover.

6) CLOTHES SUPPLIES

Collecting and storing clothes for adults and children and distributing to the refugees as well as specialised articles for children.

Additionally we face the problem with those refugees who are asking to stay in Romania and need integration, long term accommodation and integration in our society. Many of them speak only Ukrainian or Russian.

Please also note that in the first wave of refugees arriving in the past 10 days, most of them have some financial resources. But the second wave, starting next week, will be those with very poor resources and who will require better care and support.

As of Wednesday, more than 250,000 refugees crossed the Romanian border and we are expecting up to 1 million in the next 30 days or less.

We are developing different support programs including in cooperation with other important organisations such as our National Craft Grand Lodge and international charity organisations such as LIONS Romania.

This is a brief presentation of our activities in support of the Ukrainian refugees who are facing a dramatic situation at the Romanian borders.

We are living in difficult times which require us, more than ever, and out of compassion and unity, to help those in difficult situations. Brotherhood and friendship must prevail.
