A generous donation from Durham



The Provincial Priory of Durham held its Annual Malta Meeting on Thursday, 14 July to a full room at Gateshead Masonic Hall. In attendance was special guest Eminent Knight Jamie Ingham Clark, *CStJ*, Dep.Gt.Swd.B., Trustee of The St John of Jerusalem Eye Hospital Group.

After a full Malta ceremony installing a new candidate, the Provincial Prior for Durham, R.E.Kt. Richard Scott addressed those present and gave an update on the 2025 fundraising appeal started in 2021, for the St John of Jerusalem Eye Hospital, which had so far raised £19,000. This also coincides with the 50th anniversary of the separation of the Northumberland and Durham provinces.

At the end of the address the Provincial Prior presented a cheque for £20,000 to the special guest for the evening E.Knight Jamie Ingham-Clark. This together with the figure already raised in 2021, marks a total so far raised of £39,000 towards the target of £50,000.

It is hoped that the target will be exceeded by some margin.

E.Kt. Jamie Ingham Clark, thanked the Provincial Prior for the magnificent cheque and proceeded to give a very informative talk detailing the work of the St John of Jerusalem Eye Hospital. Knights Templar have been funding the hospital for over 100 years and in that time it has never been rescinded. Finally, he reported that the £20,000 would be enough to pay for 20 Retinal Repairs at a cost of £1,000 each or 28 Cataract operations at a cost of £700. In contrast to this in 2021, the hospital performed 6500 of these types of operations.

The festive board followed the meeting, and the food was enjoyed by all those present.

At the end of the evening the Provincial Prior presented E.Kt. Jamie Ingham Clark with a fundraising appeal pin.







Provincial Priory of London Church Service





On Sunday, 3 July the Provincial Priory of London held a special Church Service to belatedly celebrate the Nativity of St John the Baptist (24th June). This was organised by Rev. Niall Johnston, Dep.Gt.Alm., Provincial Prelate for London.

As a thank you for all the funds raised to date for the St John of Jerusalem Eye Hospital, the Priory Church of the Most Venerable Order of the Hospital St John of Jerusalem at St John's Gate was made available for this service. It involved wonderful prayers, readings, hymns, the Precepts and a recommitment to the work of our Orders. Rev. Niall organised and led the service.

The Provincial Priory also afforded the Knights of the Vision Beautiful the opportunity to present a giant cheque to the St John of Jerusalem Eye Hospital. This was for a total of £23,700, of which £11,700 had gone to fund a surgical stall and £12,000 for a portable auto-refractometer. It was gratefully received by Sir Andrew Cash, *OBE, KStJ*, the Chairman of the Trustees (pictured below); and David Verity, Hospitaller of the Most Venerable Order. This followed an excellent introduction from the Provincial Prior for London, R.E.Kt. David Thompson, after which both representatives of the Eye Hospital gave a formal thank you and an update on the excellent work going on in the Holy Land.

The St John of Jerusalem Eye Hospital is the only provider of eye care for many in the Holy Land providing care via its hospitals, clinics and outreach to many who would otherwise become blind or partially sighted. Their primary slogan is: "Saving Sight, Changing Lives", which is precisely what they do and the Knights Templar have supported them in this endeavour for more than a century (with some of our members being involved in both the Eye Hospital and the Most Venerable Order since their modern foundation). A high percentage of their patients are children and the elderly, hence it is a cause very close to the heart of many a Knight.





Update on the Pilgrim's progress



In the meantime, E.Kt. Rod Barker of Sussex Preceptory No. 125 completed more than 550km in his own pilgrimage for the Eye Hospital. He hiked from the Shrine of St James at Santiago di Compostela in Spain and reached the Marian Shrine at Fatima, Portugal, well ahead of his 27 day schedule so he carried on walking! He has been covering an average of more than 40,000 steps per day in hot weather, notwithstanding being in his mid-sixties.

Having exceeded his initial target of around £500, including gift aid, representing a pound per km, Rod wanted to generate more to represent his new distance and is just short of £700 including gift aid at time of writing. The 2022 Relay Pilgrimage of the Knights of the Vision Beautiful

On Wednesday, 21 September 2022 this year's *Team* challenge for the St John of Jerusalem Eye Hospital will start at St Augustine's Cross on the East Kent coast. This is the spot at which the first Archbishop of Canterbury is said to have presented himself to the King, having landed in Kent. The Knights will pass a baton from participant to participant, and running, cycling and likely rowing, will complete **more than three hundred miles**, largely following the Thames to Gloucestershire, before heading south to Wells Cathedral.

Wednesday 21st will cover Kent to the far side of London;

Thursday 22nd Surrey to Wiltshire (there is an additional opportunity to do a bit of rowing or paddling from Henley if that is of interest...);

Friday 23rd the final journeys to Gloucestershire and then down to Wells Cathedral in Somerset;

Saturday 24th is, of course, the Great Priory Family Cathedral Service in Wells Cathedral.

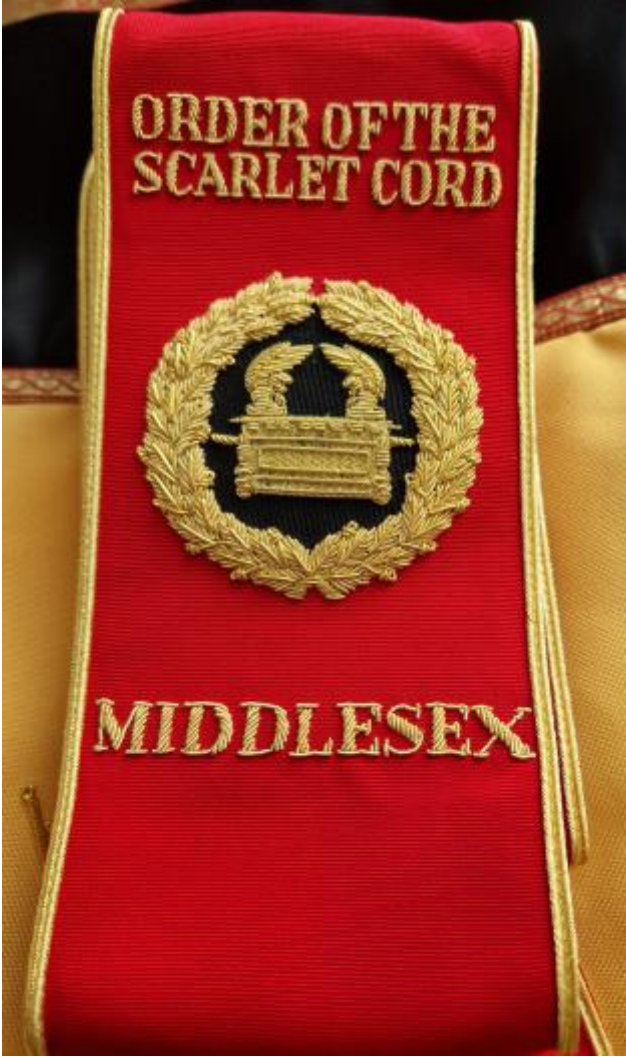
























An amazing Scarlet Cord day at Mark Masons' Hall

'Mark Mason' No. 1 bows out of service



The first 'Mark Mason' Blood Bike is due to retire after almost 7 years of sterling service to Northumbria Blood Bikes. Unfortunately the bike now needs over £2,000 of work to its braking system making it uneconomical to continue in service.

The bike has completed in excess of 86,000 miles and been on many thousands of missions travelling the length and breadth of Durham and Northumberland carrying essential medical supplies and equipment. The charity has over 100 volunteer riders, all of whom will have ridden the bike at some point during its career.

The MBF granted £18,000 in 2016 for the bike which as you know led on to the wider Blood Bikes Project and the MBF Charity Walk of 2017. Grants to the Blood Bike charities from the MBF currently stand at £497,146.

Retiring bikes with Northumbria Blood Bikes are not sold externally but are offered to their own members for personal use. All BB liveries are removed from the bike. Sealed bids from members wishing to take on the bike as a personal project are invited and funds are reinvested back into the charity.

The charity remains ever grateful of the support the MBF has given and continues to champion our cause.

But it is good to see the 'Safe Anchor Lady' back in the water doing what she does best.' Patrons of the charity include HRH Princess Anne and Sir Patrick Stewart who was born in Mirfield.

At the meeting of Mark Grand Lodge at Freemasons' Hall on Tuesday, the Pro Grand Master, M.W.Bro. Raymond John Smith, announced that the Mark Benevolent Fund would be donating £25,000 to the Mark Inspectorate of Romania who have been working proactively in many ways to provide support and relief to their neighbours in Ukraine.

This tremendous endeavour has touched Freemasons across the Constitution and many of our Brethren are keen to add their own support by making a donation.

We have set up a Relief Chest with the M.C.F. under the name of the **Mark Emergency Relief Fund** and you can now make donations in a variety of ways.

We know that there is enormous support for this already. To make the administration of donations as smooth as possible, enabling funds to be transferred efficiently to where they are needed most, we ask that you note the following advice regarding donations:

For individual donations of less than £100 - please make arrangements with your Mark Lodge for these to be collected centrally and then for the Lodge to make one consolidated donation into the Fund. These consolidated donations will count toward the Lodge's M.B.F. honorifics, rather than each individuals.

Donations of £100 or more may be made by individuals directly into the fund and will count towards the Brother's M.B.F. Honorifics

V.W.Bro. Cristian Mihutoiu, Grand Inspector for Romania has sent us details of the humanitarian activities he and his Brethren are developing for the Ukrainian refugees.

1) ACCOMMODATION

For both refugees coming from the North by car and on foot, and those coming from the South by ferry, there are requirements for short term accommodation places for at least 3-4 days, after which some of them are travelling to other European countries while others are being hosted by Romanian families. For this purpose we are cooperating with the Government to supply the following facilities:

- special tents for more than 20 people
- electrical heating devices
- beds and blankets
- personal hygiene products

On the other hand, there are many small hotel owners which offer their facilities for the refugees asking in return for the payment for the utilities (gas, water, electricity).

2) MEDICAL SUPPLIES

- emergency kits
- small surgery kits
- antibiotics and other different medicines
- disinfecting solvents
- cleaning sets
- medical face masks

3) FOOD AND WATER SUPPLIES

- sandwiches

- warm food freshly prepared
- still water
- disposable plates and cups

4) TRANSPORTATION FROM THE BORDER TO DIFFERENT CITIES AND AIRPORT

Many Ukrainian refugees are leaving Romania after 3-4 days spent at the border, through the major airports, especially Bucharest. So they need free transportation.

5) SPECIAL PSYCHOLOGICAL CARE FOR CHILDREN AND MOTHERS

Small children and mothers are very shocked and need specialised psychological assistance to recover.

6) CLOTHES SUPPLIES

Collecting and storing clothes for adults and children and distributing to the refugees as well as specialised articles for children.

Additionally we face the problem with those refugees who are asking to stay in Romania and need integration, long term accommodation and integration in our society. Many of them speak only Ukrainian or Russian.

Please also note that in the first wave of refugees arriving in the past 10 days, most of them have some financial resources. But the second wave, starting next week, will be those with very poor resources and who will require better care and support.

As of Wednesday, more than 250,000 refugees crossed the Romanian border and we are expecting up to 1 million in the next 30 days or less.

We are developing different support programs including in cooperation with other important organisations such as our National Craft Grand Lodge and international charity organisations such as LIONS Romania.

This is a brief presentation of our activities in support of the Ukrainian refugees who are facing a dramatic situation at the Romanian borders.

We are living in difficult times which require us, more than ever, and out of compassion and unity, to help those in difficult situations. Brotherhood and friendship must prevail.
