A new Provincial Prior for Somerset



For the second time this year the Province of Somerset was graced with the presence of the Most Eminent and Supreme Grand Master Paul Raymond Clement, G.C.T.

The first was for our 175th Anniversary celebration in March when a Charity Gala Dinner was held and large donations made to three chosen Charities, the primary one being the Jerusalem Eye

Hospital. Like the Family Cathedral Service to be held at Wells this event should have taken place in 2021 but due to the dreaded Covid pandemic had to be postponed.

Fortunately, the re-scheduling of the Cathedral Service for this year worked in our favour as our annual Provincial Priory meeting was the following Monday when it was planned for our then Provincial Prior to hand over to his successor.

Unfortunately, as we now know R.E.Kt. Barry Desmond Burridge, K.C.T., received the call of our Great Captain on 24 September just before he could realise his final accomplishment of attending the Cathedral Family Service in Somerset. In the current era of our Order, he holds the second longest term as Provincial Prior for Somerset.



Consequently, with the Grand Master and his Officers already being in Somerset it enabled them to spend a long weekend in our glorious part of England, and attend to our Installation Meeting on the Monday, whilst their wives/partners made a visit Rich's Cider Farm and to take luncheon there.

After dialogue with MMH, advice from the Great Marshal and rigorous planning, the arrangements were set to receive the Grand Master and his Installation Team on Monday 26 September. The venue was set up on the preceding evening and Knights arrived early the next morning to participate in the rehearsal(s).

All Knights having taken their places in the Temple the Installing Officer and his Assisting Officers entered in Procession under an Arch of Steel.

There followed a period of prayer and reflection in remembrance of R.E.Kt. Barry Desmond Burridge, K.C.T., with the M.E. & S.G.M. recollecting the endeavours he had achieved not only in Somerset but in our Order at all levels.

The M.E. & S.G.M. resumed by addressing the Knights on the purpose of the Meeting, recalling the history of the Province since the first Preceptory being opened in 1772 at Bridgwater and the

creation of the Province of Somersetshire in 1846; its advancement into Monmouth, then South Wales and finally returning to Somerset in 1953.

Moving on to the next chapter in the history of the Province, E.Kt. Paul Jeffery Davis was introduced into the Chapter Room under an Arch of Steel and his patent of appointment read aloud before he was required to recite his obligation and to pay homage to the M.E. & S.Grand Master. After being placed in his chair the Great Prelate pronounced the Benediction.

The Banner of the Province having been unfurled and placed in the East, the Right Eminent Provincial Prior was proclaimed by the Great Herald and saluted by the Knights present.

At this stage the Provincial Sub-Prior (nominate) E.Kt. Raymond Alan Sheppard was introduced into the Chapter Room under an Arch of Steel and his patent of appointment read aloud before he was required to recite his obligation and to pay homage to the Right Eminent Provincial Prior. After being placed in his chair the Great Prelate pronounced the Benediction.

The Investiture of the Provincial Officers followed with the Great Vice-Chancellor read out the names of Knights to be invested as active Officers for the coming year, and those receiving promotion.



E.Kt. D.J.Hinder was re-appointed as Commander of the Right Eminent Provincial Prior's Bodyguard, together with E.Kt. W.P.H.Blinston as Deputy Commander and Bro.Kt. M.Caswell as Registrar. The Knights of the Bodyguard were acknowledged for their commitment and proficiency and the Right Eminent Provincial Prior said that he would congratulate them individually in their own Preceptories.



At this point the Most Eminent and Supreme Grand Master and the Installing Team retired thereby enabling the Right Eminent Provincial Prior to conduct essential Provincial Priory business.

The Right Eminent Provincial Prior gave his address including a welcome to all our distinguished guests and Heads of Orders, adding that due to time constraints he could not do them justice by individually acknowledging them, but it is wonderful to see them all here –guaranteed that next year they would get due recognition.

All business having been completed the Provincial Prior closed the Chapter of Provincial Priory, concluding with the first verse of the National Anthem, heartily sung in welcome to our new Monarch, the King.

Provincial Priory of Surrey - Service of Rededication and Thanksgiving



The Biennial Church Service this year was held at the lovely old Church of St Mary's in Thorpe. We received a very warm welcome back to Thorpe by the Vicar, Revd. Damian Miles and his team.

It is impossible to say exactly when St. Mary's Church was built, although portions of the building are of venerable antiquity which leads one to believe it is a Medieval Church. In 1963 a Roman cinerary urn, dated to 120 -150 A.D. was discovered buried in the Churchyard, establishing that this site has been of religious significance for nearly 1900 years. The beginnings of the Church seen today may have been instigated by Abbot Hugh in 1110. The present Church building, with earliest sections dated around the 10th/11th century, is part of the conservation area along with several other listed and protected buildings, possibly dating from the 17th century onwards.





Permission for the Province to use the Church had been given by the Vicar, Revd. Damian Miles, who opened the service by warmly welcoming everyone present.


Horsley, Bookham & Leatherhead Riding for the Disabled Association

Rochdale Children's Moorland Home gets a helping hand from The Grand Sovereign's Care for Children Fund



The Red Cross of Constantine Division of North & East Lancashire along with the members of the St Helena Conclave No. 312 were delighted to hand the Rochdale Children's Moorland Home a grand sum of £2,500 to help with the funding of a new laptop and pay from transport for the children's seaside trips.

The home is run by Alison Starrs and operates between March and September. It is a non-profit making charity and is free to users. Donations and contributions from those that use the service are welcomed.

The home is based at Nab Farm, just to the north of Rochdale, where they have been since 1925 and can accommodate up to 30 people on a daily basis and 18 people for overnight stays using our dormitories.

The charity that provides free holidays (and clothing) for children from some very poor back grounds. They take care of 300 children a year including around 10 children a week from Social Services for 10 weeks of our season. The service been provided almost none stop for around 128 years.

Charity History

They started providing holidays in 1894, less than a mile away, in a farmhouse called Clay Clough just south of the present home. The founders were the Voluntary Aid Society which started on the 31st of October of 1892 providing help for families who were in the most dreadful poverty and circumstances.

The Society provided food, clothing, coal and cloth and gave away over 100 pairs of clogs and stockings in their first few months of that winter. The Society found work for some families and they even tried to get doctors on board to provide help as there were no Social Services and no National Health in those days.

Their first act of kindness was to hold a party for two hundred children in a Unitarian church school hall in Rochdale. 330 children were fed and entertained that day and they held several other children's parties in the following months.

Today, The Rochdale Children's Home receives no government or council funding. All income comes from donations and in house fund-raising efforts. The cost to run the home is in excess of £50,000 a year.

W.Bro. Gary Bradbury, Home Treasurer said, 'On behalf of our Committee, I would like to thank you again for your generous donation. This will make such a difference to the children and provide the much-needed technology to run our charity more effectively.'
