A fabulous one fifty at Furness



Furness Mark Lodge No 36 welcomed Prov.G.M. Keith Beardmore and Deputy Grand Secretary Daniel Heath, (pictured above, right and left of the Worshipful Master with some of the lodge members who have not yet ascended the chair) together with a host of Grand and acting Provincial Grand Officers, to a special meeting called to celebrate the 150th year of the oldest Lodge in the Province.

At the meeting in Barrow Masonic Hall, Lodge stalwart Brian Davey (below, right) was called upon to give a brief history of the Lodge. That was not an easy job as unfortunately most of the Lodge records have proved untraceable. However, Brian, with his 50 years membership of the Lodge, was able to deliver an entertaining insight into some of its early history and several of the characters who helped shape Furness Mark.

The original incarnation of the Lodge had been in 1870 when it was granted a warrant under the auspices of the Scottish Supreme Grand Chapter, when it bore the number 24. In 1872 it became a member of the English constitution and the number was changed to its present 36.



The Dep.G.Sec. read out the Sesquicentenary Warrant, signed by the Grand Master, prior to Keith presenting it to W.M. Graham Benson. One of the highlights of the evening was the Prov.G.M. requesting long time Lodge member Harry Moore (above, left) to be placed before him. There was rapturous applause when the Prov.G.M. gave Harry a field promotion to the rank of Past Provincial

Grand Junior Warden. An honour well deserved for a gentleman who has always been ready to deliver ritual or stand in for absentees at short notice.

The Lodge is obviously named after the peninsula wherein it sits. The Furness peninsula extends from the estuary of the River Leven, along the west shore of Lake Windermere up to Brathay and then across via Wrynose Pass to the River Duddon and its estuary.

But why is it called Furness? Many think it is something to do with the fiery furnaces of the now long-gone iron and steel mills of the area. But in fact it pre-dates that by several centuries. It derives from the Old Norse Futhernessa which translates as the headland by the rump shaped island. That island could be Piel Island where the remains of the castle, built by the monks of Furness Abbey, still stand. Or, alternatively, it may have been the Isle of Walney prior to changes in it features due to centuries of coastal erosion.

The meal following was enjoyed by over 70 diners with two out of the three candidates awaiting advancement amongst those at the tables. Hopefully some of the junior members will be able to enjoy the lodge hitting the double century mark in fifty years time.

Knights of the Vision Beautiful Relay Pilgrimage 2022 for St John of Jerusalem Eye Hospital

In the lead up to the Great Priory Family Cathedral Service, the Knights of the Vision Beautiful completed a Relay Pilgrimage of more than three hundred miles from St Augustine's Cross in the Province of Kent to Wells Cathedral, Somerset. They passed a new Preceptor's Baton (supplied by Humber Regalia) from Knight (&Dame!) to Knight as runners and cyclists took it through the boundaries of the Provincial Priories of Kent, London, Surrey, Middlesex, Oxfordshire, Berks & Bucks, Dorset & Wiltshire, Gloucestershire & Herefordshire and, finally, to Somerset.

All of this was in support of the excellent sight-saving work of our friends at the St John of Jerusalem Eye Hospital. A number of members of the Team have overcome very serious personal illnesses (more details below), yet undertook this marathon task and each member acquitted themselves heroically. Additional points of note were:

- the elder member of the 2022 Team is E.Kt. John Campbell who solo cycled approximately fifty miles at the age of seventy;
- the Legge family (Antony & Julie) filled in for a Knight that had an emergency and they completed a far greater distance as a result (it should be noted that Antony had one of the early and severe cases of coronavirus in 2020, but managed to recover and take part in our challenges in 2021&2);
- the Team Captain was in a bicycle accident in training for this (a week before) so completed
 his initial thirty miles on foot with a broken rib and several other injuries (that is in addition
 to recovering from blood clots, heart and lung failure prior to commencing the series of
 challenges in the first place);
- Seema Rhodes completed her cycling leg through the undulating country roads in Kent solo due to the above crash (and supported the Captain to be able to do anything this time);
- Peter Doust, who completed the penultimate leg from Gloucestershire to Somerset, following charitably donating one of his kidneys to enable a complete stranger to live, experienced a heart episode last year. His partner conducted immediate CPR and brought him back. He has trained back and has completed challenges for the Team this year and last;

 the final two Knights, Scott and Simon, managed to go on in spite of a broken chain on Scott's bike about half-way between Bathampton and Wells. Simon fixed it and they carried on to complete the challenge for the Team. Scott was in a helicopter crash a few years ago, leading to a broken back and loss of his dog. Simon survived multiple serious injuries from a near fatal car crash in 2019 in which he lost his partner of twenty years (see his page for more details). Both trained their way back from horrendous injuries and have performed amazingly in these and other challenges.

On completion of the Relay Pilgrimage, the Team Members joined with their Chaplain, E.Kt. Rev. Niall Johnston, Deputy Great Almoner and Provincial Prelate for London, and were granted the use of the Lady Chapel for a special Pilgrim Prayer Service followed by the blessing of the Baton, which is planned to be shared with a new Preceptory in due course. The Team Captain and his lovely wife also took the opportunity to renew their marriage vows by the kind assistance of Rev. Niall and in the presence of their Teammates.

A venerable Northumbrian Preceptory returns to the Active Roll of Great Priory



On Saturday, 1 October, Brandling Preceptory No. 239 returned to the Active Roll of Great Priory after its Warrant had been placed in abeyance during the pandemic.

One of the oldest Preceptories in Northumberland, it was consecrated on 25 August 1929 by the then Provincial Prior, Col. Charles Warren Napier Clavering, G.C.T.

Col. Napier Clavering was one of the greatest Freemasons of the early part of the twentieth century, serving as Provincial Grand Master and Grand Superintendent of Northumberland for over two decades from 1909; the Provincial Grand Master for Northumberland and Durham in the Mark; Intendant General in the Red Cross; Inspector General in the Rose Croix; and Grand High Priest in the Knight Templar Priests. In our own Order, he was Provincial Prior for Northumberland and Durham from 1911, Very High and Right Eminent Great Seneschal from 1913 and Knight Grand Cross of the United Orders from 1915, until he was called to Higher Service by the Great Captain of our Salvation in 1931.

Originally meeting in Gosforth, the Preceptory relocated following the closure of the masonic hall to the eastern side of our Province but, sadly, suffered declining support and, when the pandemic struck, the few remaining Knights felt the Preceptory had become unviable.

The M.E. and S. Grand Master authorised the Warrant to be held in abeyance in the hope of its revival at a later date.

The current Provincial Prior, R.E.Kt. Kevin Stannard, assisted by several of the Provincial Officers, decided to repurpose it as a "Preceptory of Improvement", relocating it more centrally within the Province and changing its meetings to a Saturday morning, three times a year, to demonstrate the ceremonies of Installation of a Knight Templar; Installation of a Knight of Malta and the Installations of a new Preceptor and Prior.

With R.E.Kt. Kevin acting as Preceptor, all the other offices were filled by Acting and Past Provincial Officers, and they were delighted to admit a candidate, Comp. Darren Bolton, from John Page Chapter in Cramlington, in an excellent ceremony witnessed by many Knights from other Preceptories in the Province as well as several Knights who had been original members of Brandling before the pandemic.

So successful was the day, that Brandling now has over 15 joining members and the likelihood of new Knights wanting to join from the Chapters meeting in the Cramlington building. There is renewed confidence that Brandling Preceptory will now go from strength to strength, looking forwards to a bright future as it proceeds onwards towards its Centenary.

Le Cordon Écarlate en France





At the end of last week 22 Companions of the Scarlet Cord from England arrived in Toulouse for a feast of French fraternisation. The team comprised all three rulers of the Order, Rulers of two other Orders, and Grand Officers present and past, all with roles to play, and mostly travelling at their own expense.

The schedule was hectic and there was a lot to do, but this was made so much easier with the fantastic efforts our French hosts had gone to, to ensure things went smoothly. The warmth of the welcome could not have been any greater and the team were looked after with tremendous kindness and generosity from the moment they arrived.

Originally, three Conclaves began working the Scarlet Cord in the late noughties under the English O.S.M. before moving to French Control as Scarlet Cord Consistories. But the Order was short lived in France and the Consistories fell into Abeyance.

But feeling has remained strong for a decade that the Order should be revived.

When a group of French Companions met the English team when both headed out to Arlington, U.S.A., earlier this year, plans was set in motion for a revival. But no-one could have foreseen just how quickly the French team would act and pull together many of the original members of the Conclaves, to bring about the need for this trip.

And so it was that on Friday, 30 September, Provence Consistory No. 68 and Occitania Consistory No. 67 were Re-Constituted, Re-Dedicated and Re-Consecrated in a specially formulated ceremony, written by the Grand Summus especially for this unique situation.

The Rock Youth Project is situated on Scalegate Road in Currock, Carlisle. After one visit Julie Wannop was devastated to see first hand the desperate need for such facilities in this deprived area of Carlisle. Having been brought up and lived in the Carlisle area she became saddened at how naive and ignorant she have been to think that the issues this area has didn't exist in Carlisle. The project got under her skin and when asked to join the Board she jumped at the chance.

The Rock Youth Project is a registered charity and limited company (not for profit) there is no charge for service users ensuring there is no financial barrier to anyone wishing to attend. This is The Rock Youth Project's unique selling point as they are the largest and only free provider in the city.

What is the Rock Youth project?

The Rock runs youth clubs in the heart of the most deprived residential areas of Carlisle for junior and secondary school children in Currock, Upperby and Harraby.

In Currock there is a distinct lack of pitches and play area facilities for children to access.

Crime statistics in these areas.

85%. Of people in Currock are in the bottom third in terms of multiple Depravation in England.

Last year 1114 cases of sexual or violent crimes were reported in the Currock, Upperby and Harraby area including:

473 anti-social behaviour cases

345 criminal damage cases

So it's no surprise that the children in these areas get caught up with alcohol & drug abuse and crimes such as drug running, and under age sex groups.

What do they provide?

- A safe place for children to go to after school and in the evenings, in the heart of their own community
- Give support and someone to talk to for those who need it most
- Food and a warm environment
- And when they can, they take them on trips, outdoor adventures and activities
- All this is provided free of charge to ensure they have fun, help and support when required

What are our targets?

- To take troublesome children off the streets at nights
- To entertain local children, many of whom don't have the support from their parents to access facilities in other parts of the city. This very often being due to their parents having medical disabilities or addiction problems.
- To provide a safe environment where they can actually be children
- To assist in educating them with gardening clubs, cookery clubs, craft & art clubs, sport and to take them on trips they would otherwise never get to visit or experience

Most importantly, to raise their ASPIRATION for their future

The Future

The existing facilities are almost derelict and the team work in extremely difficult conditions to deliver a fantastic service to these children.

They are desperately in need of financial support so that we can replace the dilapidated vermin infested wooden huts that we operate from in order to keep young and vulnerable children off the streets and out of trouble at night.

Their original plan was to build a club room out of shipping containers which would be vandal and arson resistant, but due to covid our fundraising plans were put on hold for 18 months and the price of shipping containers seems to have gone through the roof. They are not proud, just desperate, so they are now looking into second hand cabins. So, all the money they can raise will go towards the purchase of whatever portable structure we can afford.

The name "The Rock" could not be more appropriate since this club really is a place of sanctuary and safety in the stormy lives of these children.

With a plea for help like this, how could the MBF Trustees refuse. They are sutre the money will make a huge difference to this very worthy cause. The lovely thank-you e-mail sent on behalf of the Trustees of the Rock Youth Project said it all...

St Peter's Hospice patient vehicle report

 $Rosal ind \ Fursland, Trust \ and \ Philanthropy \ Officer \ for \ St \ Peter's \ Hospice, \ Bristol, \ writes:$

Following on from the very generous grants totalling £13,750 we received from The Mark Master Masons of Bristol towards a brand-new Response Vehicle for St Peter's Hospice, I enclose a report providing you with an update on the purchase of the vehicle and the success of the project, as well as a request to spend the remaining funds on two new Tilt in Space wheelchairs to help with transporting patients.

After the many financial challenges of the pandemic, including shop closures and event cancellations, this has been a year of reviving our events calendar and reopening our shops. All shops are now fully up and running and most of our big fundraising events such as 'Tour De Bristol' and 'Midnight Walk' have gone ahead successfully.

Our 'When It Matters Most' campaign generated over £500,000 for St Peter's Hospice through donations from generous individual supporters and trusts. Thanks to the amazing support for our campaign and our careful management of finances, we are now able to continue investing in our services, supporting our communities where the need is greatest.

In the wake of the pandemic and with the rising cost of living, we know that many local communities are in need of our help. For everyone that has died during the pandemic there are many more who have been bereaved, and our therapy teams are urgently needed to support those experiencing grief.

Our focus in the coming years will identify the areas of need within our local community, such as the increased need for Bereavement Support, and recognise where gaps have opened up due to the pandemic. We will enhance funding for our community-based services to ensure we are reaching the areas where they are needed most.

With the rising costs of patient care and reopening our Inpatient Unit to full capacity with 5 nurseled beds, we must ensure our services continue to receive funding from our generous supporters to meet the needs of our local community during their most challenging moments.

Thanks to the very generous support received from The Mark Master Masons, enabling us to purchase a new Response Vehicle, we have been able to continue supporting patients and families through their most difficult moments.

We will be including an article on the new Response Vehicle in our forth coming newsletter and have included a thank you to the Mark Master Masons of Bristol, with your logo printed on the vehicle itself. Your generosity makes an enormous difference across our services, and we are incredibly grateful for your support.

New Response Vehicle

Owing to your generosity, we now have our brand-new Response Vehicle at the Hospice and it has been put to work straight away.

Response Vehicles are specially adapted to transport patients in a wheelchair, as well as patients with limited mobility. The vehicle is used for bringing patients to the Hospice and enabling families to visit, supporting patient admissions and discharges to our Inpatient Unit, transporting patients to hospital appointments, collecting medical equipment and vital PPE.

The vehicle is one of two Response Vehicles the Hospice owns and provides a more flexible option for Hospice patients and their families to travel to appointments than booking an ambulance. These vehicles are extremely important to the Hospice in our commitment to equality, ensuring that all patients have access to our services irrespective of their mobility. The vehicle can fit a driver and passenger in the front and has seating for three in the rear. There is a Perspex screen behind the driver, which is now an essential Covid safety measure.

Marc Willetts, Hospice Volunteer Manager says: "From the Hospice's perspective, it gives us flexibility. Transport is difficult for a lot of patients, as is parking. A mobility car is a very helpful thing to provide, and patients know that we're looking after them with same high standard and ethos of care that the Hospice provides. It doesn't matter if the person arrives at an appointment and has to stay for longer. Feedback is always very positive as this service removes an element of stress."



Aylwyn, Volunteer

Aylwyn will be one of the drivers using the new car. He has been a volunteer driver for the Hospice for the past ten years, and he explains:

"I drive the mobility car, taking patients from their homes to appointments. I've taken a lady for an x-ray today, accompanying her from the car to the department, and driven a man to his therapy session. I also do the weekly Long Ashton run, deliver items to the shops, travel to Southmead, pick up the pharmacy boxes, and collect PPE from Barnstaple and deliver it to the Hospice.

The mobility cars are fitted with restraints for a wheelchair and have a tailgate and ramp. Our drivers are trained to operate all the equipment as we need to be able to help patients in and out of the vehicle when we take them to appointments."

Hospice Feedback 2022 "Every member of staff, particularly the nursing team (and Harry in particular) have, without exception been empathetic and have provided outstanding care. They have made a traumatic and difficult time significantly more bearable."

"The care my son experienced was very good indeed. If you had provided a box labelled outstanding, I would have ticked that or any other superlative. There is nothing I can think of what I witnessed at St. Peter's Hospice that was nothing short of superb, compassionate, and so wonderfully caring that it amounted to an act of beauty."

We were delighted to secure an excellent price for the purchase of the Response Vehicle, meaning that the total spend for the Response Vehicle itself came in under budget at £27k. We have £4,894 remaining from our Response Vehicle budget.

We were hoping that since you were so generous in providing funding for our Response Vehicle, you might permit us to redirect the remaining funds towards purchasing two new Tilt in Space Wheelchairs to help with transporting patients to and from the Hospice, as well as within the Inpatient Unit.





The wheelchairs help to move patients up the ramp and into the vehicle with ease and fit into the exact allocated space in the back of the vehicle. There is also still space to seat family members within the vehicle.

The Tilt in Space Wheelchairs will be used to assist with patient admissions to the Inpatient Unit, help with collecting patients from home so they can attend Day Services at the Hospice or be transported to the hospital for medical appointments.

These wheelchairs are ergonomically designed to be tilted, reclined and adjusted for comfort and will enable patients with limited mobility to have full access to our services. They have a multiadjustable backrest designed to accommodate different body types and provide good back support.

They are fitted with an adjustable padded headrest and armrests, while the elevating leg rests provide support and pressure relief. The wheelchair has hub brakes to ensure there is no chance of movement within the vehicle and will be secured with straps which are pre-fitted in the response vehicle.

St Peter's Hospice currently has one working Tilt in Space Wheelchair, and we have been extremely impressed by the design and comfort levels for patients. If we were able to purchase two more, it would allow us to provide the highestlevel of comfort for more patients, transporting patients from home to the Hospice, as well as within the Inpatient Unit itself.

Each Comfort Tilt in Space wheelchair costs around £2,000 and we would be enormously grateful if we could re-direct the remaining grant from The Mark Master Masons towards these purchases.

With two Response Vehicles running at the Hospice, fuel costs are currently budgeted at £1,500 per vehicle, per year, so it would be hugely appreciated if we were able to spend any other remining funds on fuel costs for the Response Vehicles. We completely understand, however, if these requests are not possible.

Thank you again for your enormous generosity in supporting us and we look forward to hearing your response.

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

To reduce gas consumption, solar parels were installed and the watering water piece were nedesigned and replaced. 



