

The Annual Assembly of Royal Ark Mariner



On Monday, Royal Ark Mariner Brethren braved snow and travel disruption to navigate a course to Freemasons' Hall and share in what for many is an end of season get together at the Annual Assembly of the Ancient and Honourable Fraternity.

The meeting was presided over by the Pro Grand Master, M.W.Bro. John Prizeman; The Deputy Grand Master, R.W.Bro. Frank Spencer; and the Assistant Grand Master, R.W.Bro. Prof Denovan Wilson.

After the business of the meeting had been carried there were three 'Honoris Causa'* appointments to the Grand Master's Royal Ark Council, R.W.Bro. Justice Rubin, District Grand Master for Singapore; R.W.Bro. Derek Thomas, Past Provincial Grand Master for Monmouthshire; and W.Bro. Jonathan Whitaker, R.A.M.G.R., a long-time member of the Management Board at Mark Masons' Hall.

There followed 113 appointments to Royal Ark Mariner Grand Rank and it was pleasing to see so many still able to attend to receive this very special honour.



The Pro Grand Master then addressed the Annual Assembly, congratulating recipients on their appointments to Grand Rank, noting that they had been awarded in recognition of faithful and distinguished service, and their enthusiasm and devotion to the Ancient and Honorable Fraternity.

He spoke too of the journey of Freemasonry and how that journey can be enhanced when taken with a Companion, linking this with the new styling of the Orders administered from Mark Masons' Hall as the 'Companion Orders'.

Following this, the Pro Grand Master was pleased to welcome visitors from Overseas and Heads of other Orders.

He also mentioned, that as Lodges in the R.A.M. have a Commander instead of a Master, perhaps he should be titled Pro Grand Commander, playfully asking the Grand Secretary to include this as an agenda item for the next meeting of the Royal Ark Council. Only three words were necessary from the Grand Secretary, "Absolutely not, Sir" came the reply.

Returning to present matters, the Pro Grand Master reiterated the special nature of this Degree, and how the aprons worn by Brethren of all Ranks within it are so similar, not increasing too much in ornateness as you progress, reminding us of the equality of the Fraternity.

There were thanks to the Grand Secretary and the team at Mark Masons' Hall; and to the Grand Director of Ceremonies and his team, for the first class ceremonial on display.

He then wished everyone a safe journey home and a happy and peaceful Christmas and new year, finishing with "may the Fraternity continue to flourish".

The only other business from the Grand Secretary was to echo the Pro Grand Master's wishes for Christmas and the new year and to thank Brethren for their support over the last 12 months.

The Grand Assembly was then closed in ample form and Brethren retired, some to dine, while others took advantage of the early finish and made their ways straight home.


Thank you to all those who were able to attend and make this, even on a very cold day, another warm and convivial meeting of this Ancient and Honorable Fraternity.

The Grand Master's visit to Romania



During the Annual Assembly of the Royal Ark Mariner, the Pro Grand Master also commented on the success of the visit by the Grand Master and a large contingent of Mark Grand Officers to Romania.

R.W.Bro. Derek Thomas gave us this report:

"The Constitution of the District Grand Lodge of Romania took place at "Le Chateau" in Bucharest on Saturday, 12 November in the presence of the Most Worshipful Grand Master, His Royal Highness Prince Michael of Kent.

The Consecrating Officer on this historic occasion being Most Worshipful Brother John Prizeman, Pro Grand Master, which was quite fitting as he had consecrated the first Lodge of Mark Master Masons in Romania, the Alexandru Vaida Voevod Lodge No. 1988, on 3 March 2018 in his capacity as Deputy Grand Master.

The District of Romania comprises 17 Mark Lodges with a membership of 680 Brethren; a remarkable achievement as the first Brethren were only advanced into the Order on 12 November 2016, not forgetting that 18 months were lost due to the Covid pandemic.

R.W.Bro. Cristian Mihutoiu, now the District Grand Master, together with four colleagues, were advanced into The Mark Internet Lodge at its first regular meeting in Castleton, near Newport in

Monmouthshire by the Primus Master, W.Bro. Roy Morris. Indeed, the Mark Internet Lodge was to continue to play a key role in the introduction and the development of the Order in Romania by travelling to Bucharest and advancing no fewer than 185 brethren in five ceremonies prior to the consecration of the first Lodge. The Officers and Brethren of the Lodge and the Province of Monmouthshire generally continued to play an active part in the Consecration of all the Mark lodges in Romania including The Prince Michael of Kent Lodge of Installed Mark Master Masons No. 2044 which was consecrated on Friday, 11 November, the day before the Constitution of the District.



The Prince Michael of Kent Lodge, which comprises, in the main, Brethren from Romania and the United Kingdom who had played an active part in the introduction of the Order, is intended to further the development of Mark Masonry in Romania and strengthen the Masonic links between the countries. The Lodge meets twice a year with the election meeting being held at Mark Masons' Hall on the second Saturday in May and the installation meeting in Romania on the third Saturday in October, and membership is open to any suitably qualified Brother."

The Pro Grand Master also spoke of how the Grand Master touched the hearts of many when he took time out of the Masonic itinerary to visit a refugee centre for those seeking safety and solace from the troubles in Ukraine.

The Grand Master took time and trouble to visit every group at the gathering and spoke to many in their own language, expressing great interest in their experiences and sympathy for their present situation.

Grabriel De Vos Rabie, is a Lewis and was Initiated into Freemasonry on 20 February 1969 in Worcester Masonic Lodge No. 1603 and advanced into the Mark degree in Drakenstein Mark Lodge No. 1120 on 28 November 1972. He was Installed into the chair of Drakenstein Mark Lodge on 30 May 2006, and again served as Master of Worcester lodge No. 1120 during the years of 2014, 2015 and 2016.

Gabriel De Vos Rabie obtained the rank of Past District Grand Senior Warden on 1 July 1989 and was given the Grand Rank of Past Grand Assistant Director of Ceremonies on 20 June 2016.

The Apron of Past Grand Assistant Director of Ceremonies that De Vos Rabie is wearing belonged to his Father, who also attained the same Grand Rank. When the voting was to take place Brother D de Vos Rabie informed the Worshipful Master that "Brother Ebbe Rabie Vossie's cousin was absent as he had attempted some Operative masonry and a wooden beam had fallen on his head nearly rendering him lifeless, but by the grace of the G.O.O.T.U. he was making a speedy recovery."

At his advancement his father communicated the Signs and secrets to him



The Most Eminent and Supreme Grand Master, Paul Raymond Clement, and his wife Molly - who live not far away in Swansea – attended and provided unexpected extra help at the organ after it was announced that the car bringing the Provincial Organist, to the happy event had broken down. The Great Marshal, R.E.Kt. Tim Wheeler, and his wife Mo, travelled from Sussex to support the event once again – and they must have had the longest journey of all.

Held after a short meeting of the Owain Glyndwr Preceptory of Installed Preceptors, the Carol Service was organised principally by their Eminent Preceptor, E.Kt. Cheshire Freemasons Christmas Toy Appeal







Last September, it was realised that many families would struggle financially this winter and may not be able to provide their children with a present at Christmas. It was decided that in Cheshire we should try to provide what help we could to ensure that all children would have a gift to open on Christmas Day.

The initiative was led by the Mark degree, with Stuart Jones acting as coordinator, but it swiftly attracted support from all Cheshire Freemasons, with generous donations also coming from the Craft and Royal Arch.

The concept was quite simple - collecting suitable toys and financial donations and passing them onto local children's and family support charities across the province in time for them to be distributed to where they were needed most, in time for Christmas day.

To facilitate this a team leader was appointed to each group of lodges across the province, and he and his small team, which comprised members from the Mark, Craft and Royal Arch, selected and coordinated with suitable local charities. The unwrapped toys were collected, and High Street shopping vouchers were purchased with the money donated, and these were then then presented to local charities.

In Cheshire we are fortunate that the respective Leaders are working closely together in supporting not only each other but such worthwhile community organisations.

Although it is difficult to put an exact figure or value on the support given it easily surpassed £12,000, with over a thousand gifts donated to local children who otherwise may have had nothing to open on Christmas Day.
