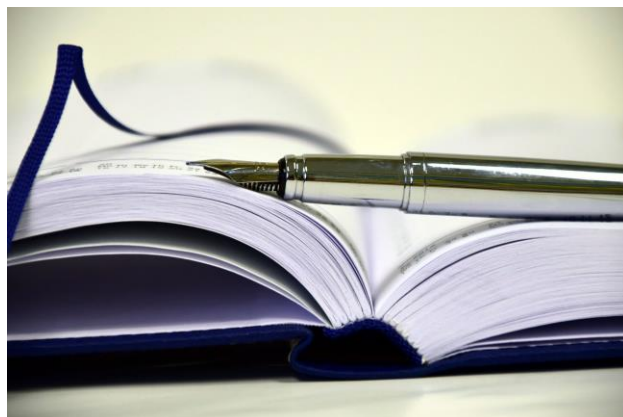

£50,000 donated to ShelterBox

On Monday, 6 February 2023 a series of powerful earthquakes devastated southern Türkiye (formerly Turkey) and northern Syria. The Trustees of the Mark Benevolent Fund were quick to act and by the close of business on Tuesday 7, had approved an emergency grant of £50,000 to help with the rescue efforts in association with our trusted partners at the ShelterBox charity. The charity is sending an emergency response team to carry out crucial assessments and establish how best their help can be deployed. Their international assessment team will arrive in Türkiye in a few days and will be liaising with contacts on the ground to establish how best to proceed.

The humanitarian need in Türkiye and Syria is immense and growing – it is the most devastating earthquake to hit the region in 100 years and could become the worst. The death toll is likely to rise significantly, and thousands of buildings have been destroyed in both countries leaving people homeless, with nowhere to sleep, in the middle of a bitter winter.

ShelterBox provides different combinations of emergency shelter aid and essential household items during its responses depending on what is needed. This could be sending tents and shelter kits, stoves, thermal blankets and clothing to keep people warm through the freezing winter nights. It could be cash to help people buy what they need to survive. Or it could be solar lights that help people when there is no electricity. Getting aid into countries and on to where it's needed after a disaster of this scale presents huge challenges especially with damage to infrastructure and supply routes. That's why ShelterBox strategically pre-positions aid around the world, including in Syria.

This donation of £50,000 from the Mark Benevolent Fund will allow ShelterBox to act quickly, adapting how they work to best support people affected by the earthquakes and allowing them to tailor aid packages to what is needed. There are currently no plans to set up a central fund from Mark Masons' Hall.

This is what the grant will be used for by the ShelterBox charity (information taken from the ShelterBox website):

SHELTERBOX TENT - £350

When disaster strikes, families need shelter to feel safe again. When they can't start rebuilding their homes immediately, durable tents can make them feel safe and protected. Depending on the weather and the place, the shelter needs of families differ. That's why we're committed to providing families with the best possible solutions that suit their needs. From padded tents that can safely accommodate a stove, to medium-sized tents that fit in small spaces and ones that can last years if needed, families can feel at home again.



SHELTER KITS - £60

We provide shelter kits which include a selection of hardware tools and materials that are customised to suit the needs of each community. The tools and materials we send provide the essentials families need to start rebuilding homes straight away, ranging from tough tarpaulin and timber to corrugated sheeting and even room dividers. The versatile tools we provide help with everything from clearing rubble to building shelters and even tending crops. Our tools can also be used to build furniture, cut firewood and make repairs.



BLANKETS - £7

Blankets, groundsheets and mattresses not only provide vital warmth, but comfort too when families are recovering from disaster. These simple items can be used in a variety of ways, from bedding to room dividers, and help turn a shelter into a home.



SOLAR LIGHTS - £11

Our solar lights can last up to 24 hours on just one charge on the lowest setting. They are lightweight and waterproof, making them easy to carry in any situation. Because they are so safe, cheap and easy to use, families use solar lights in different ways – for work, education, family activities, or simply moving around at night. They are more than just light – they can provide comfort and allow families to regain their livelihoods.

Red Cross contribution to Kent Scouts Shackleton Expedition



In 2022 eight Scouts from Kent, together with two from Scotland, travelled to Antarctica to mark the centenary of Ernest Shackleton's trip there. The Craft Provinces of East & West Kent had already supported the Expedition and, having spoken with Alan Noake, who is the Assistant County Commissioner (Global Projects) for Kent, it was clear that further support was required to enable the Scouts to spread the legacy of their expedition, and the need for protecting the planet and especially Antarctica.

This led to Nick Alder, in one of his last acts as the outgoing Intendant-General for Kent, approving a donation of £300 to the Kent Scouts Shackleton Expedition project, and last week he formally presented the Division's cheque to Alan Noake at a most impressive presentation of the trip at Deal town hall (pictured above).

This was a project close to Nick's heart, being a Queen's Scout, and whilst not considered to be eligible for an application to the Grand Sovereign's Care for Children Fund, the legacy of the expedition is being spread across not just the Scout Movement in Kent, but the Scouts who took part in the expedition have

gone into many schools in Kent to share their experiences, and enthuse young children to work for the environment, and the donation will help their work.

THE CHAPS/TACKLE/MASONIC PROSTATE CANCER SCREENING PROJECT SYNOPSIS

Every year over 12,000 UK men die from Prostate Cancer (PCa) - more deaths now than from breast cancer - and 50,000 new cases present, half of whom have advanced, incurable PCa. Despite the availability of the simple screening blood test Prostate Specific Antigen (PSA) for earlier detection, its use is still not encouraged due to outdated fears of over-diagnosis and over-treatment even though these problems have been eliminated from current UK practice.

Countries extensively using PSA have seen their PCa death rates fall consistently and in long-running clinical trials PSA has halved the PCa death rate! Consequently, in 2020 the European Commission has recommended the introduction of national PCa screening programmes. Despite having this same evidence, the UK National Screening Committee in October 2020 again opposed a national screening programme. Meanwhile, our PCa death rate continues to rise and languishes amongst the worst in the western world!

The status quo is unacceptable. Consequently, CHAPS and TACKLE (The National Federation of Prostate Cancer Support Groups) have commenced a programme of risk-based testing initiated by the Metropolitan Grand Lodge of London. Four Masonic Provinces and 5 screening charities have already joined the Project.

The Project is underpinned by a broad base of clinical specialists, the European Association of Urology, independent experts, a national laboratory, the national network of TACKLE, the screening charity GFCT, the Division of Population Health, Health Services Research & Primary Care at Manchester University and Imperial College, London.

The Project's objectives are to halve PCa mortality and demonstrate the practicality of screening at scale. In addition, individual PCa risk assessment will allow us to introduce advances in diagnostic MRI scanning and genetic testing for men at high risk of PCa.

Project Design

Recruitment is initially for 3 years to a PSA-based screening programme for men aged 40-80 with testing frequency based on an individual's risk: annually for men at high risk, biennially for intermediate risk and 3 yearly for men at low risk. Risk is determined by a man's initial PSA, his ethnicity and family history of PCa or breast and ovarian cancer.

Preliminary studies in 2020 for nearly 800 men at 8 events confirmed the clinical utility of the Project which we are now rolling out through an increasing number of contributing organisations across England and Wales.

Programme Advantages

- Reduce PCA deaths by 50% at 20 years' follow-up.
- Reduce late presentation with complications and metastases.
- Provide rapid access to NHS MRI scanning.
- Reduce both over-diagnosis and under-diagnosis.
- Facilitate research opportunities for men at risk (imaging and genetics).
- Improve quality of life after curative treatment versus long-term palliation and death.
- Early diagnosis enabling minimally invasive treatments with reduced side effects.
- Screening and curative treatment is far cheaper than late-stage palliation.

The national scope of this Demonstration Project will provide the most cost-effective confirmation that organised screening is the fastest way to reduce our unacceptable PCA death rate, avoid outdated harms of screening and correct the inequity of screening provision for UK men.
