Mark Diamond celebrations for W.Bro. David Tait



Congratulations from everyone at Northumberland Freemasons to W.Bro. David Tait of Hartford Lodge of Mark Master Masons No. 546, which meets at Bedlington Masonic Hall, on completing sixty years of service to Mark Masonry.

David was born in Choppington, Northumberland and comes from an interesting background as his late mother, who was originally from Italy, along with his father, started a business in Choppington in 1927, opening a café cum ice cream parlour known in those days as "Temperance Bars". They sold mainly confectionary but later included more groceries. They made their own ice cream in a small factory behind the shop, with everyone in the area saying that the best ice cream ever was made by David.

His father's plan was to expand the business so that there five shops, one for each of his children. However, the children did not share the same idea and it did not work out that way. They therefore ended up with four shops, one each at Choppington, Bedlington, Ashington and North Seaton.

David attended Morpeth Grammar School then did his National Service in the RAF. After this he then worked in his father's business and when his father died at a relatively young age he, along with other members of his family, took over running the shops until he himself retired. Although he has one son he did not join the business and it finally closed in the 1990s.

David's father was a Freemason who was a member of all of the Lodges in Bedlington and, although he did not actually propose him into a Lodge, was instrumental in him joining. David was initiated into Eadwine Lodge No. 4398 in September 1961 becoming Master in 1973. His first appointment in Provincial Grand Lodge was to Past Provincial Junior Grand Deacon and was then given a field promotion, to Past Provincial Grand Registrar, on the same evening that he was presented with his Craft 60 year certificate by the Provincial Grand Master, R.W.Bro. Ian Craigs, at the Centenary Meeting of Eadwine Lodge in October 2022. He also had a brother called Stan who was in the Craft and the Mark but never went through the chair.

David was advanced into Hartford Lodge of Mark Master Masons on 9 January 1962, was installed as Master of the Lodge in 1976 and then appointed as Provincial Grand Standard Bearer in 1980.

In November 2016 the then Assistant Provincial Grand Master, W.Bro. Richard Northey, presented David with his 50 years of membership certificate and also on behalf of the Provincial Grand Master at the time, R.W.Bro. Gordon Craigs, appointed him Past Provincial Grand Senior Warden as a field promotion.

Tuesday, 14 March 2023 became a very memorable evening for Hartford Lodge when it was honoured by the presence of the Provincial Grand Master R.W.Bro. Raymond Walton who was in attendance to present David with his certificate commemorating 60 years of Membership of the Mark Degree.

After Ray had presented the certificate to David he thanked him for his many years of loyal and dedicated service to Hartford Lodge and the Mark Degree and he hoped that he would have many more years to enjoy the companionship and friendship of the Order.

This marvellous evening was finally rounded off by an excellent meal in the very enjoyable company of friends.

described the many things that Croydon was famous for over the years and said that it was good to see so many Districts represented today.

David ended by saying that he can speak at length, but in view of the busy agenda we will be relieved to know that these words will be his last. East and West in Unison at Timothy John Lewis Council



1 - Brethren start to gather early

Every year, Timothy John Lewis Council No. 190 (an A.M.D. Council for District Officers from both East and West Lancashire) meet in March at Chorley Masonic Hall to perform the Grand High Priest ceremony. So, on Wednesday 22 March 2023, Allied Masons converged on Chorley to be part of this spectacular Degree, properly described as 'A Convention of the Holy Order of Grand High Priest'.

Seats in the Council were at a premium for Observers, in fact there were rumours that ticket touts were operating on Cunliffe Street which fronts the Masonic Hall. It really was a superb attendance, and this helped to build the tension. The W.M., David Redhead, opened the Council in the Saint Lawrence Degree in the Lodge Room upstairs at 11 a.m. on the dot, the downstairs room having been set up as a 'Tabernacle' for the Grand High Priest Ceremony. The gavel of the Council was proffered to the District Grand Prefect for West Lancashire, R.W.Bro. Paul Snape, who on this occasion wisely returned it to the W.M. as much work remained to be done. Salutations were given to the Dist.G.Pref., and subsequently to R.W.Bro. Mervyn Frank Wilson, Dist.G.Pref. for East Lancashire, and other Right Worshipful Brethren.

The D.C., having a feeling that a very important Brother had been left outside the Council, sought leave to retire and investigate. Sure enough, waiting patiently outside the door was one Thomas Firth Jackson, Grand Master of this Order, a Past Dist.G.Pref. for West Lancashire, member of this Council and resident of this Parish. Admission was quickly demanded for this extremely popular Mason, and, with perhaps a little trepidation, the W.M. announced that he would be delighted, and honoured to receive him. Such was the Grand Master's eagerness to enter the Council, he couldn't wait to be announced by the D.C.,

and strode into the Council while the formalities were being completed. He was being offered the gavel as the D.C. stumbled and fumbled to catch up with the pace of events (we can't get the staff you see). The Grand Master returned the gavel, was seated and subsequently saluted with Eleven.

The W.M. then had a sad duty to inform Brethren of the recent deaths of V.W.Bro. Brian Fairhurst and W.Bro. Eric Croasdale. A prayer was given by the Lodge Chaplain and Brethren stood to order in memory of departed merit. The business of the Council was then conducted and congratulations were offered to W.Bro. Edwin Schofield who was declared W.M. for the ensuing year, together with V.W.Bro. Geoffrey Catterall who was declared Treasurer. Both thanked the assembled Brethren for the honour bestowed. The Council was subsequently closed in the Saint Lawrence degree, and Brethren retired to attend the main event in the downstairs Lodge Room.

I don't know about the representative Candidate, but Marc put the fear of the Great Disposer in me as he rushed forward to challenge him! Thirdly, R.W.Dist.G.Pref., if we carry on with G.H.P. MBF wheels out a big donation for Newcastle Wheelchair Rugby



Recently the Mark Province of Northumberland presented an application to the Mark Benevolent Fund for financial support for Newcastle Wheelchair Rugby.

I am delighted to be able to inform you that on Friday, 24 March, Darren Coleman-Heald, the Charities Manager at Mark Masons' Hall, was in touch with us to confirm that the petition had been approved and is to be supported with a grant of £35,798.28 which is the total sum that was applied for.

This is to purchase eight junior specialist rugby wheelchairs and will benefit disabled under 16s, four small junior wheelchairs for ages 8 - 13 years old and four larger wheelchairs for age group 13 - 17 years old and is inclusive of the maintenance costs needed to keep the chairs in good working condition

Darren informed us that the MBF receive many applications for support for sports wheelchair assistance but the detail in our excellent application went a long way in securing this grant. So well done to all who were involved in putting together and supporting the application.

Many thanks also to the Trustees of the MBF for supporting this application and for the impact this will have on improving the lives of disabled young people.

£50,000 donated to ShelterBox

On Monday, 6 February 2023 a series of powerful earthquakes devastated southern Türkiye (formerly Turkey) and northern Syria. The Trustees of the Mark Benevolent Fund were quick to act and by the close of business on Tuesday 7, had approved an emergency grant of £50,000 to help with the rescue efforts in association with our trusted partners at the ShelterBox charity. The charity is sending an emergency response team to carry out crucial assessments and establish how best their help can be deployed. Their international assessment team will arrive in Türkiye in a few days and will be liaising with contacts on the ground to establish how best to proceed.

The humanitarian need in Türkiye and Syria is immense and growing – it is the most devastating earthquake to hit the region in 100 years and could become the worst. The death toll is likely to rise significantly, and thousands of buildings have been destroyed in both countries leaving people homeless, with nowhere to sleep, in the middle of a bitter winter.

ShelterBox provides different combinations of emergency shelter aid and essential household items during its responses depending on what is needed. This could be sending tents and shelter kits, stoves, thermal blankets and clothing to keep people warm through the freezing winter nights. It could be cash to help people buy what they need to survive. Or it could solar lights that help people when there is no electricity. Getting aid into countries and on to where it's needed after a disaster of this scale presents huge challenges especially with damage to infrastructure and supply routes. That's why ShelterBox strategically pre-positions aid around the world, including in Syria.
This donation of £50,000 from the Mark Benevolent Fund will allow ShelterBox to act quickly, adapting how they work to best support people affected by the earthquakes and allowing them to tailor aid packages to what is needed. There are currently no plans to set up a central fund from Mark Masons' Hall.

This is what the grant will be used for by the ShelterBox charity (information taken from the ShelterBox website):

SHELTERBOX TENT - £350

When disaster strikes, families need shelter to feel safe again. When they can't start rebuilding their homes immediately, durable tents can make them feel safe and protected. Depending on the weather and the place, the shelter needs of families differ. That's why we're committed to providing families with the best possible solutions that suit their needs. From padded tents that can safely accommodate a stove, to medium-sized tents that fit in small spaces and ones that can last years if needed, families can feel at home again.



SHELTER KITS - £60

We provide shelter kits which include a

The tools and materials we send provide the essentials families need to start rebuilding homes straight away, ranging from tough tarpaulin and timber to corrugated sheeting and even room dividers. The versatile tools we provide help with everything from clearing rubble to building shelters and even tending crops. Our tools can also be used to build furniture, cut firewood and make repairs.



BLANKETS - £7

Blankets, groundsheets and mattresses not only provide vital warmth, but comfort too when families are recovering from disaster. These simple items can be used in a variety of ways, from bedding to room dividers, and help turn a shelter into a home.



SOLAR LIGHTS - £11 Our solar lights can last up to 24 hours on just one charge on the lowest setting. They are lightweight and waterproof, making them easy to carry in any situation. Because they are so safe, cheap and easy to use, families use solar lights in different ways - for work, education, family activities, or simply moving around at night. They are more than just light - they can provide comfort and allow families to regain their livelihoods.
