We all agreed that it was a most enjoyable day at Sussex by the Sea.



## The Prince Michael of Kent Lodge

#### Mark Masons' Hall Saturday 13th May

The Prince Michael of Kent Lodge of Installed Mark Master Masons No. 2044 was consecrated on Friday, 11 November, the day before the constitution of the District of Romania. A special day for Romania and indeed a very special day for The Mark Internet Lodge 1975 and the Province of Monmouthshire as R.W.Bro. Derek Thomas, P.Prov.G.M. (Monmouthshire) was installed as the Primus Master. What made the occasion even more memorable was the fact that the Consecration of the Lodge and the installation of the Worshipful Master had been undertaken by the Deputy Grand Master and Pro Grand Master respectively, in the presence of M.W.Bro. HRH Prince Michael of Kent, *GCVO*, Grand Master.



The Prince Michael of Kent Lodge comprises, in the main, Brethren from Romania and the United Kingdom who had played an active part in the introduction of the Order; and is intended to further the development of Mark Masonry in Romania and strengthen the Masonic links between the countries. The Lodge meets twice a year, with the election meeting being held at Mark Masons' Hall on the second Saturday in May and the Installation meeting in Romania on the third Saturday in October. Membership is open to any suitably qualified Brother.



So, the next meeting will take place on Saturday, 13 May, commencing at 12:30 p.m. with the festive board to follow at 2 p.m. An opportunity for Brethren to attend and participate in a Mark meeting in the headquarters of the Order.

For the information of Brethren from South Wales and Monmouthshire, the majority of Brethren thus far will be travelling by train from Newport at 8:55 a.m., returning from Paddington at 7:15 p.m. All Mark Brethren, regardless of rank are able to attend and any installed Master would be most welcome to join this somewhat unique Lodge, the annual subscription of which is a modest £25.

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#### Hospital Update

In the midst of political uncertainty, the security situation in Jerusalem remains very fragile and further escalation is expected during Ramadan, which commerced on the 22" March and runs through to the 21" April. At St John of Jerusalem Eye hospital, we are moritoring the situation closely and all staff have been informed that they should never take risks when coming to or leaving work.

Additionally, following the recent earthquake affecting both Turkey and Syria, Israel has been revaluating its preparedness for such an incident. Consequently, our hospital buildings will be assessed regarding their resilience to withstand powerful earthquakes and excusation training will be rolled out to all staff.

These issues make it harder for us to plan as there is more uncertainty surrounding funding that we can rely on. This means that our supporters around the world are more pivotal than ever to our work and the vital services we can offer to disadvantaged communities. We'd like to extend our thanks for your continued support.



### £50,000 donated to ShelterBox

On Monday, 6 February 2023 a series of powerful earthquakes devastated southern Türkiye (formerly Turkey) and northern Syria. The Trustees of the Mark Benevolent Fund were quick to act and by the close of business on Tuesday 7, had approved an emergency grant of £50,000 to help with the rescue efforts in association with our trusted partners at the ShelterBox charity. The charity is sending an emergency response team to carry out crucial assessments and establish how best their help can be deployed. Their international assessment team will arrive in Türkiye in a few days and will be liaising with contacts on the ground to establish how best to proceed.

The humanitarian need in Türkiye and Syria is immense and growing – it is the most devastating earthquake to hit the region in 100 years and could become the worst. The death toll is likely to rise significantly, and thousands of buildings have been destroyed in both countries leaving people homeless, with nowhere to sleep, in the middle of a bitter winter.

ShelterBox provides different combinations of emergency shelter aid and essential household items during its responses depending on what is needed. This could be sending tents and shelter kits, stoves, thermal blankets and clothing to keep people warm through the freezing winter nights. It could be cash to help people buy what they need to survive. Or it could solar lights that help people when there is no electricity. Getting aid into countries and on to where it's needed after a disaster of this scale presents huge challenges especially with damage to infrastructure and supply routes. That's why ShelterBox strategically pre-positions aid around the world, including in Syria.

This donation of £50,000 from the Mark Benevolent Fund will allow ShelterBox to act quickly, adapting how they work to best support people affected by the earthquakes and allowing them to tailor aid packages to what is needed. There are currently no plans to set up a central fund from Mark Masons' Hall.

This is what the grant will be used for by the ShelterBox charity (information taken from the ShelterBox website):


