

Yet another momentous occasion in the history of Knight Templar in Sussex, celebrating the 150th anniversary of the first Malta meeting of The De Warenne Preceptory No. 126 of Knights Templar.

Consecrated on 18 January 1873 as the De Warenne Encampment (the second K.T. unit consecrated in Sussex), it was probably the last unit to be Warranted in this style before changing from an Encampment to a Preceptory.



The Preceptory's second meeting was a Malta meeting held on the 11th July 1873 with eight candidates to be made Knights of Malta and that is what was being celebrated in such fine style with four new Knights being received into the Order of Malta in a great ceremony and produced by a combination of De Warrene No. 126 and Thornton No. 208, which both meet at Brighton Masonic Centre (the HQ of Sussex Masonry), on subsequent days and have over the years formed a very strong bond.

In its sesquicentennial year the members of the Preceptory elected the Past Provincial Prior R.E.Kt. Toby Pratt, K.C.T., as the Eminent Preceptor/ Eminent Prior.



The Provincial Prior, R.E.Kt. Colin Dann, accompanied by his Bodyguard and Provincial Officers, were also in attendance to mark this unique occasion in the history of both the Preceptory and the Province.

Yet another milestone for K.T. masonry in Sussex with much more to follow in September.



Charities round up



It's Incredible! The MBF helps a charity help charities!



Two branches of the Mark Benevolent Fund came together this week at the 'Incredible Design Company' – a charity based near Lewes in Sussex.

The charity supports severely disabled adults who are unable to access traditional employment, but who still wish to take part in work at a level and pace suitable to each individual.



The Incredible Design Company needed new specialised printing equipment to continue their work and to allow more people access the facilities. The Mark Benevolent Fund was asked by the Sussex MBF to help make up the difference in the project cost. The Sussex MBF awarded £4,000 and the balance was supported nationally by the Mark Benevolent Fund raising the total needed of £16,950. A great example of the MBF working together for local charities and communities.



Many of the people who work here are former residents or attendees of the nearby 'Chailey Heritage Foundation', a charity that has been supported by the MBF in the past. However, once they reach the age of 21 this support cannot be continued at the foundation and this is where the Incredible Design Company steps in.



Bristol Baby Bank Network

The Province has been supporting the Bristol Baby Bank Network since the Installation of our Provincial Grand Master R.W.Bro. Stephen Rawlings, who reinvigorated our support of 'local' charities. The Province has donated in excess of £4000 over the last five years and continues to include this Charity as one to be considered each month. The support of our Brethren has enabled the Province to maintain its donations to this worthy charity.

I wish to thank them for their generous donations.

We have received this very nice note from CEO Becky Gilbert:

Dear Brian,

I hope this email finds you well. I hope that you can please pass this email on to all of your colleagues who have supported us over the years, along with our gratitude. Without support from people such as yourselves, we would not be in the position of growth that we are currently in.

We have been incredibly busy here at <u>Baby Bank Network Bristol</u> over the last year or so, and I wanted to send you some important updates about the charity, what we have achieved with your support, and to share some of our plans for the future.

Baby Bank Network Bristol is 8 years old, and in that time we have helped over 8000 families! What an incredible journey we have been on since a group of mums first got together in 2015 and decided

to do something to relieve poverty in families with young children, by redistributing pre-loved baby and children items to families in need across Bristol and the surrounding area.

By April 2023 we had redistributed over 27,500 items, partnering with over 400 different referral partners to achieve this. We could not have got this far without your support, and we would like to say a huge thank you for believing in our work and supporting us on our journey so far.

In the last year we have seen a rapid increase in demand for our services, and now support on average 160 families per month with essential items for their babies and children. Towards the end of 2022 we received 76 referrals in our busiest week ever.

Between April 2022 and May 2023, Baby Bank Network Bristol helped 1,586 families by redistributing 5,477 items.

We know that the support we provide has a positive impact, with 97% of families who responded to our latest survey agreeing or strongly agreeing that they were less stressed about providing for their baby due to this support.

To find out more about the impact we have made with your support, please read our **2022-23 Impact Report** which is available to download on our website and is attached to this email.

Having survived the Covid-19 pandemic, we are currently in a period of rapid growth. In the last year we have doubled our staff team from two to four: Office Manager, Service Manager, Fundraising and Communications Coordinator and now our first CEO, supported by an army of fantastic volunteers. I was delighted to be appointed as Baby Bank Network's first CEOin May 2023, and have been tasked with navigating this period of growth, the increase in demand for our services, and driving forward the charity's expansion to ensure that Bristol's most vulnerable families are supported in their time of need.

Recently, we made our first steps into the community by opening <u>our first charity shop in Sparks</u>

<u>Bristol</u>, selling pre-loved maternity wear, children's clothes, books and toys. Profits are put back into running our core referral service. We have also launched a <u>new website</u>, including a new system for donating pre-loved items which has had a significant impact on reducing admin.

We have achieved a huge amount together, but we also know that there are more families we could be helping. One in five children (17,500) in Bristol live in income deprived families. We are reaching a fraction of these families, and we expect the increase in referrals to our service to continue to grow. We are developing plans for community hubs so that we can begin to work in the communities that we support to supplement our core referral model. We are also looking to move to a larger warehouse, re-open our delivery service and migrate to using a new CRM over the coming year.

Thank you so much for helping make all this possible, without your support we could not have come this far. We very much hope to work more with you to achieve our aims in the future, and reach more families in Bristol who are experiencing poverty or crisis.

"The Bloods Nearer to Home Project" - The Christie Local Phlebotomy Service Update




W.Bro. Barry Heal, P.Dep.G.Swd.B., sent us this update on the Mark Benevolent Fund grant to The Christie Hospital in Leeds. Patients at The Christie required routine blood tests before having Systemic Anti-Cancer Therapies (SACT) on consecutive days. This meant they had to visit The Christie twice during the week of treatment. The Bloods Nearer to Home Project was set up to reduce the amount of travelling needed and centralise these tests.

'Just to let you know that this project is now fully functional in 11 locations in Manchester and Lancashire.

Yesterday, I went to St Anne's Hospice at Little Hulton to witness the siting of the "pop-up" banner in the foyer of the clinic. The same banner is also situated in all locations. I met with Sister Amanda Conners and Hazel Rushton, Trust and Foundations Development Manager, The Christie Charity who were delighted with the way the project had been managed.'

Woodland House Update



Below is an update from the Birmingham Women's and Children's Hospital on the progress of the building of Woodland House. The MBF awarded £100,000 for the provision of two counselling rooms at the new neonatal bereavement centre:

In hospitals across the country, the current model of bereavement care for baby loss is not meeting the critical needs of women and their families. With your support, Birmingham Women's Hospital is undertaking an ambitious capital project to transform the bereavement experience for women and

families experiencing baby loss in the West Midlands. Woodland House will be the first neonatal bereavement centre of its kind in the UK, setting a new standard of care.

Construction on Woodland House began early this year and is well underway. Our contractor, Building Services Now (BSN) has been making great progress, with the foundation now laid and the frame of the corridor connecting Woodland House to our Delivery Suite starting to rise. With construction on schedule, our plan to open Woodland House to patients and families in Autumn 2023 is still on track. To follow the progress of construction, please visit Woodland House Build Progress (bwh.org.uk), where updated photos of Woodland House will be posted on a regular basis.

Over the past several months, the project team and our patient families have continued to work together to finalise the design for the interiors of Woodland House. They are also working with Martineau Gardens, a local charity that manages therapeutic garden spaces, to co-design the outside spaces. These spaces will be a core element of Woodland House and will be designed to honour loss and nurture the soul. These spaces will be at the front of the building, in the Reflective Garden at the centre of Woodland House, and in the private gardens of our two Family Rooms. We are also working to develop a partnership with a local prison with a woodworking training programme to see if they can create bespoke pieces of outdoor furniture for Woodland House, including benches, chairs, bird houses and a variety of planters. Our plans to include a green roof and other green elements within the project are also still on track.

Donor Recognition

We remain incredibly grateful for your gift to Woodland House. As one of our major donors, you are instrumental in making this vision a reality and we are pleased to be able to honour your significant contribution in two ways.

As a leading donor, the MBF name will be incorporated into the fabric of the building. We will commission special engraved panels to be placed vertically within the siding by the entrance to Woodland House. The panels will be designed to blend in with the look and feel of the house, providing an elegant entry without infringing on the overall tone and sentiment of the house. An artistic rendering to give you an idea of what this will look like has been included here.



The MBF name will also be included with all of our £10k+ donors on a special feature located in one of the gardens at Woodland House. Once the design of this feature has been finalised we will write again and include another update on the progress of the build.

We look forward to keeping you posted on our progress and to writing again in the near future with another update and an invitation to official opening of Woodland House.

Farewell duties in Northumberland O.S.M.



On Thursday, 6 July Right Worthy Brother Colin Hume, Provincial Grand Supreme Ruler of the Order of the Secret Monitor for Northumberland, carried out his last official duty before the Province is merged with the Province of Durham to form a New North East Province.

Accompanied by his Deputy, Worthy Brother Reece Valentine, and his Provincial Grand Recorder, Worthy Brother Paddy Watters, he attended the Great North Air Ambulance headquarters at Progress House, Eaglescliffe, Stockton on Tees to present a cheque for £2000.00. This was £1000.00 from the Province, which was matched funded by the OSM Benevolent fund in London.

We were given a tour of the building by Ben Hunt, the community fundraiser and a guided tour of the helicopter and all of its equipment, by John Kirton, a helicopter paramedic. He gave us a very descriptive account of the type of operations they have to carry out while attending accidents all over the North of England, South Scotland and now the Isle of Man.

At present they are using the Air Cumbria helicopter. As they now have to cross the Irish Sea to cover the Isle of Man, the ambulance has to be able to float and theirs is away for 12 months awaiting the flotation equipment being fitted to enable it to do so.

The GNAA is almost entirely funded by charity, we were thanked for the very king donation and invited back at any time. We were only too pleased to be able to help in a small way.

£50,000 donated to ShelterBox

On Monday, 6 February 2023 a series of powerful earthquakes devastated southern Türkiye (formerly Turkey) and northern Syria. The Trustees of the Mark Benevolent Fund were quick to act and by the close of business on Tuesday 7, had approved an emergency grant of £50,000 to help with the rescue efforts in association with our trusted partners at the ShelterBox charity. The charity is sending an emergency response team to carry out crucial assessments and establish how best their help can be deployed. Their international assessment team will arrive in Türkiye in a few days and will be liaising with contacts on the ground to establish how best to proceed.

The humanitarian need in Türkiye and Syria is immense and growing – it is the most devastating earthquake to hit the region in 100 years and could become the worst. The death toll is likely to rise significantly, and thousands of buildings have been destroyed in both countries leaving people homeless, with nowhere to sleep, in the middle of a bitter winter.

ShelterBox provides different combinations of emergency shelter aid and essential household items during its responses depending on what is needed. This could be sending tents and shelter kits, stoves, thermal blankets and clothing to keep people warm through the freezing winter nights. It could be cash to help people buy what they need to survive. Or it could solar lights that help people when there is no electricity. Getting aid into countries and on to where it's needed after a disaster of this scale presents huge challenges especially with damage to infrastructure and supply routes. That's why ShelterBox strategically pre-positions aid around the world, including in Syria.

This donation of £50,000 from the Mark Benevolent Fund will allow ShelterBox to act quickly, adapting how they work to best support people affected by the earthquakes and allowing them to tailor aid packages to what is needed. There are currently no plans to set up a central fund from Mark Masons' Hall.

This is what the grant will be used for by the ShelterBox charity (information taken from the ShelterBox website):

SHELTERBOX TENT - £350

When disaster strikes, families need shelter to feel safe again. When they can't start rebuilding their homes immediately, durable tents can make them feel safe and protected.

Depending on the weather and the place, the shelter needs of families differ. That's why we're committed to providing families with the best possible solutions that suit their needs. From padded tents that can safely accommodate a stove, to medium-sized tents that fit in small spaces and ones that can last years if needed, families can feel at home again.



SHELTER KITS - £60

We provide shelter kits which include a selection of hardwearing tools and materials that are customised to suit the needs of each community.

The tools and materials we send provide the

The tools and materials we send provide the essentials families need to start rebuilding homes straight away, ranging from tough tarpaulin and timber to corrugated sheeting and even room dividers.

tarpaulin and timber to corrugated sheeting and even room dividers. The versatile tools we provide help with everything from clearing rubble to building shelters and even tending crops. Our tools can also be used to build furniture, cut firewood and make repairs.



BLANKETS - £7



At the meeting of Mark Grand Lodge at Freemasons' Hall on Tuesday, the Pro Grand Master, M.W.Bro.
